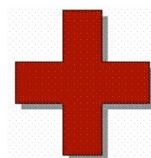

day 1 ISAIAH 7:1-6

DWELL

🕒 How did Ahaz and the people respond when they felt threatened by Aram (v. 2)?

➔ In contrast, how did God describe the nations that were threatening Judah? Why is God's tremendous power good news for us?

Ahaz and the people's response to the nations that were threatening them demonstrated the state of their hearts. They were not resting in the Lord. In response, God sent Isaiah to tell Ahaz to calm down and be quiet and even referred to the kings who were threatening them as "smoldering sticks"—meaning they did not present a lasting threat. This story reminds us that we serve a God who is bigger than our fears and can't be intimidated.

MEMORIZE

Ask a friend or family member to memorize Isaiah 7:14 with you this week. Quiz each other several times this week.

PRAY

Thank God for His vast power and ask Him to help you rest in Him.

day 2 ISAIAH 7:7-13

DWELL

God promised Ahaz and the people of Judah, through Isaiah, that the threat they faced from the armies at their doorstep would not be successful. God, however, warned that Judah's success against their enemies depended on their continued faith. While God's favor is not something that can be earned, it is something that must be trusted in. God, through Isaiah, was testing the faith of Ahaz and the people of Judah. God still tests our faith today. Through the situations and circumstances we face, God is at work, calling us to deepen our trust in Him.

← What would happen if the people of Judah did not stand firm in their faith?

➔ Why did Ahaz refuse to ask for a sign? How might you fight the temptation not to do what God commands?

MEMORIZE

Break Isaiah 7:14 down into several parts, and work on reciting each part one at a time from memory before trying to recite the whole verse.

PRAY

Ask God to deepen your faith and grow in your love for Him.

day 3 ISAIAH 7:14-19

DWELL

While God promised to be with Ahaz and to give him a sign of hope and salvation, that did not mean that there would not be serious consequences for the king's sinful attitude and actions. The Assyrians, who also devastated Ephraim and Syria (v. 16), would also invade Judah (v. 17). In other words, this passage reminds us that our God is just and sometimes lets us face the consequences of our sin in order to teach us to root our hope and trust in Him rather than in ourselves.

↑ What sign did God give Ahaz despite the king's failure to listen to God? Why is this good news?

➔ When have you had to face consequences for breaking a rule? How might God use consequences to grow our faith?

MEMORIZE

Use a dry erase marker to write Isaiah 7:14 on a mirror you use every day or write it on a notebook card and tape it to the mirror. Erase or mark out a few words each day until you've memorized the whole verse.

PRAY

Thank God for the promise of new life in Christ.

day 4 ISAIAH 7:20-25

DWELL

This passage demonstrates the complex and far reaching nature of prophecy. God would use Assyria to humble Judah but this was designed ultimately to pave the way for a future day of redemption and restoration.

↑ What does this passage teach you about God's plan for Judah? Why is this good news?

➔ When have you been brought low or humbled? What did God teach you through this experience?

MEMORIZE

Go somewhere quiet and read Isaiah 7:14 aloud several times. Note key words and think of images or hand motions to help you memorize the verse.

PRAY

Ask God to help you trust that He has a plan for you and that living for Him is worth it.

day 5 MARK 1:12-15

DWELL

Where Ahaz and the people of Judah failed, Jesus succeeded. He refused to give into temptation and stayed the course of establishing the kingdom of God.

🕒 Why is it good news that Jesus was tempted but never gave in?

➔ Jesus called those who received the good news to repent. What sin do you need to turn from this week?

MEMORIZE

Check in with your friend or family member from Day 1 and continue to challenge each other to commit Isaiah 7:14 to memory.

PRAY

Thank God for overcoming temptation and for the hope that this brings you and all who trust in Jesus.
